Grant: Festivals Australia

Provider: Department of the Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts

Category: Arts & Culture

Funding: Small projects are those seeking funding support of up to \$12 000.

Large projects are those seeking funding above \$12 000.

Closes: 15 July 2010

Purpose: To provide funds for Australian regional and community festivals to assist them to present quality cultural projects.

Overview: Funds are available to present exciting new projects which will add to the cultural program of a regular ongoing festival or a significant one-off community celebration.

Funds are not available for projects such as competitions, capital works (e.g. the construction of buildings, or the purchase of equipment) or the ongoing costs of running the festival.

Assistance is provided in the form of direct funding, subject to a formal Funding Agreement.

You cannot receive funding from Festivals Australia, the Regional Arts Fund or the Indigenous Cultural Support Program for the same project or the same event at a festival.

Who can apply: Applications must be made by organisations that manage regular festivals. Eligible organisations include local governments and councils, cultural organisations and regional arts councils that manage festivals.

Who can apply: For a non-profit organisation or community group to be supported by the CanDo4Kids foundation it must be:

- Approved as a Registered Tax Exempt Charity and Deductible Gift Recipient
- A Community Service Organisation which although not registered as a Tax Exempt Charity is of a non-profit nature these include:
 - Sports & Social Groups
 - Community Groups
 - Community Welfare Groups
 - Education Groups
- Able to provide accountability to ensure that Grants are applied and managed in accordance with the information outlined in the formal Grant Agreement.
- Providing activities based in South Australia, however, interstate requests will be considered if they are relevant to the Foundation's mission and pertain to a specific South Australian project.
- Willing to provide clear, measurable objectives and expected key outcomes for Grant allocation.

For an individual to be supported by the cando4kids foundation they must:

- be 25 years or under

What can you use the grant for?

This category aims to have wide application, so the following are broad but not exclusive examples:

- development of efficient and cost-effective models of online program distribution including audio streaming and podcasting that can be adopted by other community broadcasters
- seed funding to assist community broadcasters to create formal partnerships to establish cost-effective and sustainable online program distribution systems
- trial of innovative online technologies for program distribution between community radio stations
- trial of innovative online technologies for station applications, for example use of wireless or IP links for outside broadcasts
- creative uses of digital audio technology with an online application relevant to community broadcasting
- research relevant to the above
- Any project focussed on the distribution of audio content should have regard for other systems operating in the sector, and inter-operability.

- a community radio station with a long-term or a temporary licence, or
- a State, regional or national community broadcasting association

General Grants - Sustainability and Development - Funds are available to develop the sustainability of the community broadcasting sector through capacity building projects such as innovative projects outside the scope of the other General Grant categories. The grants assist with the maintenance and development of general community radio broadcasting throughout Australia.

Transmission Support Grants - Equipment

Funds are available to help community radio stations purchase necessary transmission equipment. The grants assist with the maintenance and development of general community radio broadcasting throughout Australia.

Transmission Support Grants - Operational Subsidy

Funds are available to subsidise community radio stations for transmission operational costs. These grants are offered once per year, to reimburse stations for their actual transmission costs during the financial year. The grants assist with the maintenance and development of general community radio broadcasting throughout Australia.

Transmission Support Grants - Special Projects

Funds are available to provide support for:

- projects and local partnerships that aim to increase the sustainability and self-sufficiency of community radio transmission infrastructure, and

- the development and trial of innovative solutions to community radio transmission issues, including the use of new technologies.

Limitations: Grants are not available to stations broadcasting under a Temporary Community Broadcasting Licence (TCBL) or with a narrowcast licence.

Who can apply: You can apply for a Transmission Support - Operational Subsidy grant if you are a long term licensed community radio station transmitting from any type of site, including Broadcast Australia, TXA, Telstra, local council, self-owned or other.

- Books of documents or photographs without substantial historical intent or analysis
- Projects completed or publications published before the closing date for applications.

Unincorporated organisations may be eligible if an incorporated organisation is willing to sponsor their application.

Cultural Trust

The Ian Potter Cultural Trust seeks to encourage the diversity and excellence of emerging artists in Australia.

The Trust makes grants of up \$7,000 to early career artists practising in a wide range of disciplines within the arts, including the performing and visual arts, crafts, music, the media, literature, Indigenous art, design, community arts and other areas.

Music Commissions

The Ian Potter Music Commissions is a biennial national program conducted by The Ian Potter Cultural Trust and is for the composition of new Australian music.

Performance of the new work is an essential feature of each Commission. The Ian Potter Music Commissions has two categories:

- Established Composer - \$80,000 for the creation of a substantial body, or portfolio of work over two years; and
- Emerging Composer - \$20,000 for the creation of a portfolio of work over two years.

It recognises that carers living on a property in a remote or very remote area may experience higher costs in making these improvements.

The \$5000 payment may be used to meet the costs of modifying infrastructure to comply with safety, legislative and regulatory requirements associated with the provision of Family Day Care. This could include installing a fence around the home to protect children from the inherent dangers on a rural property.

The remoteness of the area will be determined by the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations using the Australian Standard Geographic Classification index.

Who can apply: Family Day Care Start Up Payment (\$1500)

You must:

- Not have provided care for more than three months with any Family Day Care scheme, prior to submitting your application
- Have registered and have begun the approval/licensing processes and have your application supported by your Family Day Care scheme
- Have provided proof of age to your Family Day Care scheme
- Have completed a current criminal record check (police check) and be deemed a fit and proper person to provide care to children
- Have had a home/safety assessment no older than three months performed by the Family Day Care scheme; this assessment must be signed, dated and have the address of the premises that the home assessment is referring to
- Have an active Australian Business Number (ABN)
- Not have received start up assistance through any other Government Department
- Intend to provide Family Day Care for a period of at least six months from the date you sign your Funding Agreement.

If successful, you must keep receipts of all expenditure in relation to establishing your Family Day Care business and must be able to produce these receipts to the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations upon request. You may also use the payment to reimburse past expenditure as long as you can provide evidence in the form of receipts that the past expenditure was directly related to establishing a Family Day Care Business.

Remote Area Family Day Care Start Up Payment (\$5000)

In addition to meeting the eligibility criteria above, applicants for the Remote Area Family Day Care Start Up Payment must also:

- Be living on a property in a remote or very remote area. The remoteness of the area will be determined by the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations using the Australian Standard Geographic Classification index
- Not have received the Family Day Care Start Up Payment of \$1500.

For a LPG conversion or new LPG vehicle purchased on or after 1 July 2009, you may be eligible for one of the following grants:

1. For the LPG conversion of a registered vehicle:

- \$1,500 for a conversion completed between 1 July 2010 and 30 June 2011; or
- \$1,250 for a conversion completed between 1 July 2011 and 30 June 2012; or
- \$1,000 for a conversion completed between 1 July 2012 and 30 June 2013; or
- \$1,000 for a conversion completed between 1 July 2013 and 30 June 2014.

2. For the purchase of a new vehicle fitted with LPG before first registration:

- \$2,000 (This includes vehicles fitted with LPG at time of manufacture and vehicles fitted with LPG after manufacture but before first registration).

For a LPG conversion or new LPG vehicle purchased before 1 July 2009, you may be eligible for one of the following grants:

- \$2,000, for the LPG conversion of a new or used petrol or diesel motor vehicle; or
- \$2,000, for the purchase of a new motor vehicle with an LPG unit fitted at the time of manufacture, for vehicles purchased on or after 10 November 2008; or
- \$1,000, for the purchase of a new vehicle with an LPG unit fitted at the time of manufacture, for vehicles purchased before 10 November 2008.

Limitations: A vehicle is NOT eligible if:

- the vehicle is subject to a novated lease at the date of LPG conversion or the purchase of the new LPG vehicle;
- the vehicle is financed through a salary sacrifice arrangement at the date of LPG conversion or the purchase of the new LPG vehicle;
- the vehicle is a motor scooter, tricycle or boat; the vehicle is authorised to travel on public roads in limited specified circumstances only, such as a classic car.

Repairs, maintenance or upgrades to an existing LPG system are not eligible for a grant.

Who can apply: You are eligible to apply for a grant if:

- you have not received a grant under the Scheme in the previous three years. Three years are calculated from:
 - the date of the LPG conversion that was the subject of the previous grant; or
 - the date of purchase of a new LPG vehicle that was the subject of the previous grant; and
- you have either converted a registered vehicle to LPG or purchased a new vehicle fitted with LPG before first registration
- for LPG conversions - you will need to show proof that you have paid for the parts AND installation of
 - LPG conversion kit.
- for new LPG vehicles - you will need to show proof that you have paid for the vehicle.

You must complete your LPG conversion or new LPG vehicle purchase before you make your application.

You may be eligible for a grant if you have, or will, receive assistance for LPG conversions under State or Territory Government assistance programs.

- dates of the proposed course/study/project
- a one-page profile of yourself and a summary of the course/study/project you are proposing to undertake (for publicity and presentation purposes)
- an outline of the costs associated with your proposal
- an outline of how the funds will be used.

Please include any further information that you consider relevant to support your proposal.

Selection Criteria:

Successful applicants will be selected against the criteria of the Augusta Zadow Scholarships:

- to make significant health and safety improvements for women through research and further education and/or
- to provide a solution to a health and safety issue faced by women.

Who can apply

Applicants for the Augusta Zadow Scholarships must be:

- permanent residents of South Australia
- individuals who are able to commence their study/project/research in 2011.

Grant: Transition to Independent Living Allowance (TILA)

Provider: Dept of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations

Purpose: To assist some young people who are making the transition from formal and informal care to independent living.

Overview: If you are eligible for Transition to Independent Living Allowance (TILA) you can get assistance in paying for some of the things you need to successfully make the transition to independent living.

What can be paid under the allowance?

- Connection to Utilities to assist in the establishment of housing
- Moving expenses
- Appliances
- Whitegoods
- Furnishings
- Consumables
- Financial or other counselling
- Education
- Transport to undertake studies or employment
- Bus Tickets, Phone Cards etc
- Examples: Examples of necessary relief include, but are not limited to:
- Support to enter accommodation (such as connecting utilities and moving expenses);
- Purchase of essential household items (including appliances, whitegoods or furnishings and consumables etc);
- The cost of supported life skills programs to equip a young person with the skills for independent living (for example, financial or other counselling);
- Support to access employment, education or training opportunities (such as purchase of books/computer, transport to undertake studies or employment); and
- Purchase of bus tickets, phone cards or other essential items that will support the young person in accessing the above.
- **Priorities:** The TILA Service Provider will also ensure that young people in identified groups have full and appropriate access to TILA, including:
 - Young people with a disability;
 - Young people from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds; and
 - Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander young people.
- This should be done through the promotion and marketing of TILA by the Service Provider.
- **Limitations:** TILA is not designed to be used on an ad-hoc basis for crisis assistance.
- Therefore, TILA funds should not be used to replace assistance that is available through other existing schemes, such as:
 - Rental bond assistance schemes;
 - Centrelink payments e.g. maternity payment;
 - Scholarship funds; and
 - Other transitional support schemes.

Where a transition support program or similar support measure exists, TILA should not be used to replace any of these support measures. However, if a young person has received the maximum benefit or support available under an existing measure and the need is still unmet, there is scope for TILA to be used to complement this.

Example: TILA funds cannot generally be used for bond assistance if a young person can receive bond assistance from a state or territory government. However, if a young person can only receive partial bond assistance from a state or territory government, TILA can be used to fund the difference.

Who can apply: To be eligible for the Allowance, the young person must:

- Be a permanent Australian resident; and
- Be aged from 15 to 25; and
- Be approaching (within 6 weeks of applying) or experiencing an exit from Care or if having already exited Care has done so no more than 24 months prior; and
- Be subject to one or more Risk Factors for an Unsuccessful Exit from Care; and
- Not have received TILA assistance before; and
- Have been in, or currently be in, Care.

Overview: Funding priorities:

- Projects which benefit disadvantaged young people by addressing the causes of poverty and injustice.
- Projects which are not eligible for funding from public or government sources.
- Projects that address violence, social justice, economic and social disadvantage.
- Projects which address the needs of disadvantaged children and young people directly.
- Projects involving education, arts and culture, employment and training, housing and accommodation.
- Priority will be given to peak bodies, self-help groups, neighbourhood projects and direct service provision.

Applications are made in two stages, Preliminary Enquiry and Detailed Application. A Preliminary Enquiry will be notified of the outcome within two weeks of receipt and if considered to have merit may be invited to submit a Detailed Application. A detailed application, provided all required information has been received, will be reviewed

and submitted to the Board for approval. Applicants may be required to supply further documentation before an assessment is made.

Applicants will be notified in writing of the outcome of their detailed submission.

Limitations: Legal and policy considerations prevent the Foundation from supporting or making grants in the following categories:

- Individuals, state and federal government bodies
- Organisations outside Australia
- Projects which can receive funding internally, by a government agency or corporate sponsorship
- Operating costs including salaries, administration costs, budget deficits, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Capital and building expenditure, including equipment, vehicles, furniture, books, conferences, and religious activities, unless such costs are part of an otherwise eligible project
- Retrospective funding
- Fundraising events and campaigns
- Travel
- Medical programs or research

Who can apply: If your organization does not have Income Tax Exempt Charity (ITEC) status and are a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) we will not be able to consider your application.
